# And, Yet...

It's raining again, a slow, miserable drizzle that matches my mood. Thunderclouds have developed in my brain, and my outlook is gloomy. The recent death of a dear friend has me numbering my days.



I am missing calls from my mother, who no longer remembers how to use a phone. Other family members all live too far away for spontaneous get-togethers, and my grandchildren are growing up without me. Loneliness has settled in like an unwanted guest, and I feel like Job had nothing on me.

Grumpily, I do what I usually do when the world gets to be too much. I pick up my Bible and play Bible Roulette, letting it fall open with a prayer that a message from God will leap off the page and be just what I need to hear to get me out of the doldrums. It opens to Habakkuk, and I begin to read:

"Though the fig tree does not blossom, and no fruit is on the vines, though the produce of the olive fails, and the fields yield no food, though the flock is cut off from the fold and there is no herd in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will exult in the God of my salvation. (3:17-18)

Trust and Joy in the Midst of Trouble is the headline for this passage of Scripture, and once again, I marvel at the way the Spirit always seems to speak to me in my need. Habakkuk's list of difficulties is long, and yet, the prophet finds reason to rejoice. It is the "yet" part of the passage that catches my attention. As my Spiritual Formation Bible points out, that one little word – yet – turns Habakkuk's dirge into a dance. His long list of trials is transformed into triumph as he chooses to exult in his God rather than wallow in life's catastrophes.

Suddenly, my little problems are put into proper perspective, and I realize how good my life really is. It may rain outside, *yet*, *inside*, the light of God's love is always there, shining brightly in my soul, if I but notice. I say a prayer of thanks for my life *in spite* of my troubles. The clouds in my brain are lifted, and my outlook is sunny once again.

May you, too, find hope in the midst of your troubles in that one little word - yet. **Pastor Barb <><**

### **Ministry Opportunities Abound!**

The Evangelism / Social Outreach Committee's purpose is to help put our faith in action as we share the Good News, by reaching out to the physical, spiritual, and social needs in the community, and to be a light to reach the spiritually slumbering, unchurched, and new residents. Some see each ministry as mutually exclusive, with Evangelism being focused on spiritual concerns, and social ministry seeing to the carnal needs of our neighbors, but they are entwined. Mt. Zion St Luke has been singularly blessed. Some of the ways we have directly ministered in sharing the Gospel in the past is providing Bibles to the Jail, supporting Kairos, devotionals shared at the Bread of Life {when in person meals were provided, but now through scripture verses in every takeout tray. Ironically, the pandemic that has kept us physically apart, has provided an unprecedented tool for MZSL in allowing folks to be able to watch services virtually, and share them with others. It was St. Francis who said, "Preach always, use words only if you have to". Our outreach lets us be the hands and feet of our Savior to show Christ's love through our actions. Some of the avenues God has used us has been providing meals at the Soup Kitchen, the Foster Children's Christmas party, Nursing Home hymn sings, food drives, toiletries for the women's prison, sharing Bomba socks with shelters and nursing homes, assistance for the victims of natural disasters, and in helping to provide oxygen tanks - the very air a person breathes- for India in the ongoing pandemic. It is shown in every stitch that was sewn in the Quilting Circle. The needs in our community are ongoing, but what a blessing in being able to provide for them, with God's help. "By this we know what love is: Jesus laid down His life for us, and we ought to lay down ours for our brothers. If anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, but withholds compassion to him, how does the love of God abide in him? Little children, let us love not in word and speech, but in action and truth. 1 John 3:116-18. Coming up Sept 12th, we have a special opportunity in God's Work Our Hands Sunday to celebrate all that we are as Believers and better serve?
