The Man Upstairs...

If you have ever stayed in a cheap hotel where the walls are so thin you can hear the guy next door snoring, you can relate to what it must have been like to live in tenement housing in the early 1900" s.

Imagine: six floors of bedrooms all piled on top of each other, and you could hear every footstep of the people who lived above you.

There is an old vaudeville joke that speaks to that situation. A man comes in late at night to a boarding house, rather worse for the wear. He sits on his bed, drags one shoe off and drops it on the floor with a thump. Guiltily remembering that the people in the apartment below him are trying to sleep, he takes the other shoe off and quietly sets it on the floor. He then finishes undressing and gets into bed. Just as he is drifting off to sleep, a shout comes from the man in the room below: "Well, drop the other one already! I can't sleep, waiting for you to drop that other shoe!"

As far as anyone can tell, this is where we get the phrase, "I'm waiting for the other shoe to drop." We say this when we have that eerie feeling that something bad is going to happen, and we are just waiting for it. It's past midnight, and the kids haven't come home yet. The economy is tanking, and we are afraid to check our retirement account balance. Someone is very ill, and we are waiting for the phone call that says they tested positive for COVID. It isn't a good feeling, waiting for the other shoe to drop – expecting the next bad thing.

Some of us think about God like that; like God is the man upstairs holding our fate in his hands, and we are down here below, spending sleepless nights, waiting for that other shoe to hit the floor. But, God says he *delights* in giving *good* gifts to his children! Could it be that the troubles we encounter in life aren't a punishment for wrong doing or even to teach us a lesson – that maybe the bad things don't come from God at all? Could it be that God is there, waiting to help us put our lives back together again after *someone else* has dropped that shoe on us? If so, then that opens us up to adopt the *expectant* attitude of faith - not waiting for the next *bad* thing to happen, but waiting with a child's joyful trust for the next *good* thing God has in store for us.

May you be filled not with dread, but with joyful expectation, trusting that your God will turn all things to good in his good time.

Synod Council Basics

As Pastor Barb reported in last month's newsletter, I was elected to the Synod Council in March and installed at the Synod Assembly in 2019. I plan to report to our congregation about activities of the council routinely in our newsletter. For this article, I thought some basic information about the council may be helpful. The Synod Council is to the Southeastern Synod what our congregation council is to MZSL—a decision making body serving as the board of directors for the synod. A total of 17 persons serve on the council—the four officers (bishop, vice president, secretary and treasurer) and 13 elected representatives. Each of our conferences has one representative serving a two-year term with re-election to a second term allowed. Conference elections are staggered so that roughly half the conferences elect their representatives each year. Additionally, at-large members of the council are elected each year during the Synod Assembly. The election process is designed so that there are more lay persons than clergy on the council at any given time. The Synod Council routinely meets three times each year, once in conjunction with the annual Synod Assembly and twice as a stand-alone meeting, usually in the Atlanta area. The meetings typically last about a day and a half, with the Executive Committee meeting about two additional hours before the other meeting. Because of COVID-19 we have had two additional called meetings so far this year and, beginning with our usual June meeting, we have been meeting via ZOOM. The vice president chairs the council, with the bishop participating as a voting member, much like our pastor's role on the congregation council.

I was elected as the representative of Conference 2, the Good N.E.W.S. Conference. My interest in serving on the council is for two main reason. First, at the Synod Assembly year after year I have seen council members installed with rarely, if ever, anyone from a small, rural congregation like ours. And there are many congregations like ours in the synod, so I thought we needed a voice at the table. And second, I have been curious about the workings of the synod council; I'm not presently serving in a leadership role in our congregation; and I'm not getting any younger. So, I thought this was a good time to give it a try. As far as I know, I am the first person from MZSL to serve on the Synod Council, and I want to represent us well, especially as I learn more about the process and people involved with the council. My future articles will address issues discussed by the council and programs sponsored by the synod. Phase 1 Guidelines for In-Person Worship to Continue through October 2020

In assessing the situation for our own community, we are hearing from the medical community that this virus may ramp up as cooler weather sets in, so with that in mind, we will continue to worship in-person using the same guidelines as when we first returned in June. Please do not come to worship if you have lost your sense of smell, have a fever or a cough or have difficulty breathing. Also, please notify Pastor Barb if you have tested positive for Covid 19 and have attended a worship service. We will notify the members who worshiped in person that day without identifying you unless you give us permission, so that they can be tested to be sure they have not contracted the virus as well. We continue to offer our service online for those who are unable to join us in person.


We will continue to use the following precautions as per synod guidelines for our in-person worship:

- 1. Face coverings and social distancing of at least 6 feet in family groups will be required.
- 2. Hand Sanitizer is at both entrances for your use upon entering the building.
- 3. Offerings will be placed in the plate at both entrances.
- 4. Communion will be self-contained individual cups picked up at the entrances.
- 5. No physical passing of the peace.
- 6. Face coverings and social distancing of at least 6 feet to be kept after the service as well.

Thank you for making a difficult situation easier by your constant support and cooperation with your leadership at MZSL. We value your input. We thank God for you! Pray for containment and a vaccine.
